Trailblazer Race Returns September 25th Proceeds Benefit the Friends of Stevens Creek Trail



SEVENTEENTH **Trailblazer Race** 2011

The fun and exciting 17th annual Trailblazer Race and Trail Walk will be held on Sunday, September 25, on the scenic Stevens Creek Trail in Mountain View, so save the date! The Friends' annual fundraiser features both 10K and 5K races, a 5K (3-mile) scenic trail walk and free kids' events. All proceeds benefit the nonprofit Friends of Stevens Creek Trail.

The main race and walk events start at 8:30 a.m. sharp. They include a free race T-shirt for all registered participants and are open to everyone of any age who can safely participate. Free age-appropriate children's races start at

approximately 9:45 a.m. In addition, inflatable mazes and games, face painting and a raffle drawing are a big part of the festivities.

"This fun and family-friendly occasion is carefully planned for all ages and experience levels, from children to senior citizens, and from first-timers to competitive athletes," says Aaron Grossman, executive director of the Friends. "We love to put it on each year to get more people outside for fun and healthy exercise and out on the trail. It is all made possible by support from the city of Mountain View, Presenting Sponsor Microsoft Corporation and a number of other generous sponsors."

All events originate at the Microsoft campus, 1065 La Avenida Avenue in Mountain View. The 5K (3.1-mile) and 10K (6.2-mile) footraces are certified by the U.S. Track and Field Association and officially timed. They head north on the trail to Shoreline Park before returning back to campus for a spirited finish in front of a crowd of cheering onlookers. The more relaxing, non-competitive and self-paced 5K (3.1-mile) trail walk enters Stevens Creek Trail from the Microsoft campus and heads south, away from the runners, through a particularly scenic stretch of trail. Complimentary food, water and Starbucks coffee (while it lasts!) are provided.

This year's free T-shirt will be adorned with the 2011 Trailblazer Race logo—a soaring Pelican—created by local artist Bill Murray. (Participants in free children's events do not receive complimentary T-shirts.) All registered participants including the children are eligible for a post-race drawing of valuable prizes donated by race sponsors.

"Many adult and student volunteers are needed to come early and help set up the event, hand out food and water, guide participants along the course, manage the kids' events and help clean up," says Grossman. "Pre-registered volunteers receive a free race T-shirt and, for the first time, are eligible to become a member of the Friends of Stevens Creek Trail. They simply need to complete the attached form or a copy to register as a volunteer, and either mail it in or email us a copy."

Runners and walkers are encouraged to sign up in advance for a \$5 discount. For the discount, participants should mail the fully completed newsletter registration form (or a copy) to the Friends with a check by September 12, or register online with a credit card at www.stevenscreektrail.org by September 22. Businesses, organizations or individuals can help sponsor the event or donate prizes by emailing exec-dir@stevenscreektrail.org or calling 408-255-5780.

Since 1992 the Friends organization has been dedicated to the completion, enhancement and enjoyment of the trail and wildlife corridor. The Trailblazer Race helps raise funds each year to support the Friends' work.

Annual Creek Clean-up Recovers Bags of Debris from Swollen Stream

The Friends of Stevens Creek Trail, the city of Mountain View and dozens of volunteers joined forces once again this spring for another highly successful Stevens Creek Trail and Creek Clean-up, one of the Friends' biggest annual events.

Held on Saturday, April 16, the clean-up attracted a wide range of participants, from individuals and families with young children to corporate teams, including about a dozen from Mountain View employer Blue Coat. The "Blue Earth" team, with a strong commitment to community and the environment, was an enormous help this year. Blue Coat even provided tasty pizza for all the hungry volunteers!

Under the direction of the Mountain View Parks and Recreation Department, the annual clean-up event is one of the many ways the Friends organization and its volunteers give back to the community. In just a few hours, workers help with weeding or planting projects, repaint benches and signs and, most important, haul dozens of bags of trash from the creek. Tennis and golf balls, paint cans, beverage containers, sleeping bags, old shoes and a seemingly endless supply of packing "peanuts" always seem to head the list of recovered items.

This year, city officials would not allow volunteers to wade into the creek because of high water levels, but they still managed to recover plenty of debris, working from the creek's bank. The trail itself, as usual, was quite clean, a credit to its users and the volunteers who patrol the trail throughout the year. This tends to confirm the Friends' view that trail users generally do not litter—and if they do, another trail user usually comes along to remove the offending item.



The Friends would like to thank the city of Mountain View and the many volunteers who helped make the 2011 clean-up successful. Thanks to you, the Stevens Creek Trail and Wildlife Corridor remains one of the most pristine and enjoyable outdoor experiences in the South Bay. Well done!

Trail Progress

Mountain View, Sunnyvale, Los Altos, Cupertino

JCWG and City Updates

The Friends' long-term goal of a continuous, multi-use trail along Stevens Creek from San Francisco Bay in Mountain View to the foothills of Cupertino gained significant new momentum in the 12 months since our last newsletter. As part of the Joint Cities Working Group, officials from the four cities along the creek—Mountain View, Sunnyvale, Los Altos and Cupertino—continued to meet on a quarterly basis to discuss ways to move forward with this shared objective. Trail progress was made by cities through both the JCWG and independently.

Joint Cities Working Group

The Los Altos Stevens Creek Trail Feasibility Study completed in 2008 made it apparent that, with the creek being the border between different cities, the plans for the remaining portion of the trail might be compromised if restricted to being within a single city. This led to the successful formation of the Joint Cities Working Group, comprised of city council and staff members from the four cities as well as representatives from the Santa Clara Water District and Santa Clara County Parks.

This past year, Sunnyvale has taken the lead role with the primary effort focused on conducting a joint Stevens Creek Trail Feasibility Study in order to determine a preferred route for the trail, along with alternatives. We expect that a consultant will be hired to conduct the feasibility study, researching all possible routes and holding public meetings to gather additional ideas and opinions. Sign up on our website to insure you will be notified.

In order to fund the study, the group applied for many grants, but none was awarded to them—learning that funding is more readily available for building trails, but not for planning them. As a result, the JCWG has now decided to scale back the feasibility study and fund it themselves. Thus far, Sunnyvale has come up with \$75,000 towards the study. The other cities have each already done their own feasibility studies. Nonetheless, Los Altos is contributing \$12,500, Cupertino is contributing \$10,000 and Mountain View is contributing \$5,000. The Friends of Stevens Creek Trail is also contributing \$5,000 since this is such a vital part of completing the trail.

Mountain View

With over 4.5 miles of the Stevens Creek Trail already being enjoyed, Mountain View continues to work diligently to fulfill the dream of connecting the San Francisco Bay to Skyline Ridge. Their current work is well under way on the trail extension from Sleeper Avenue, over Highway 85 to the corner of Dale Avenue and Heatherstone Way. Look for work on the actual bridge over the freeway to start in September. The extension is expected to open in December 2011 and final landscaping work to be completed by February 2012.

While this trail extension might be relatively short, it breaks through a major barrier for pedestrians and bicyclists—Highway 85. In addition to the many commuters to Shoreline Business Park from east of Highway 85 that will take advantage of this safe crossing, scores of elementary school students attending Huff Elementary School will also find this to be a beautiful, safe and direct route to school.

Mountain View still has a plan to take the trail to Mountain View High School, but this may be years off. Recently, the first \$483,060 of funding was set aside towards the estimated \$3,000,000 needed to complete the design of this segment. No funding is yet available for the construction of what is likely to be a rather expensive segment. Mountain View also participates in the Joint Cities Working Group, along with Sunnyvale, Los Altos, and Cupertino. The group is looking at fully connecting the Stevens Creek Trail through those cities and plans a feasibility study of the possible connections. The outcome of this may affect Mountain View's own plans.

Mountain View remains active taking care of its existing trail. They continue to explore gaining access to the trail from the north side of El Camino Real near the tunnel. The City also has plans to replace the rotted boards on the bridge over the railroad tracks and Central Expressway.

Many have probably noticed another pedestrian and bicycle bridge construction project, this one over Highway 101 near Old Middlefield Way. This is an extension of the Permanente Creek Trail from the Shoreline area with a bridge over Highway 101 and then a tunnel under Old Middlefield way near Spring Street, not far from Crittenden Middle School. We look forward to this addition to Mountain View's growing network of trails.

Sunnyvale

Sunnyvale has continued its new-found enthusiasm for the Stevens Creek Trail by not only acting as lead agency for the Joint Cities Working Group feasibility study, but also procuring the bulk of the funding for it. The study will be the first step in finding the best route(s) to connect the Mountain View and Cupertino sections of the trail. With Sunnyvale's leadership, and additional funding and support from the other three cities in addition to the Friends, the feasibility study should be fully funded by the end of 2011.

Los Altos

Los Altos continues to support the Stevens Creek Trail effort through their participation in the Joint Cities Working Group. Council member Megan Satterlee is representing Los Altos at those meetings. Los Altos has also appropriated \$12,500 from their general fund towards the Joint Cities Working Group trail feasibility study.

Cupertino

Cupertino was proud to show off its 0.7 miles of the Stevens Creek Trail to officials from Mountain View, Sunnyvale, and Los Altos when it hosted the May Joint Cities Working Group meeting. Also showcased was the rerouted, restored, and rejuvenated Stevens Creek through Blackberry Farm. The native plantings are thriving, so one would never know it's just three years since bulldozers razed the abused landscape there.

A short trail from Scenic Circle crossing the creek to Blackberry Farm was constructed this spring and recently opened in June. This provides cyclists and pedestrians with a low-stress access from the west to Stevens Creek Trail, Blackberry Farm, and McClellan Ranch Park. It also creates a safer route to school for many students who live west of the creek.

Plans to continue the trail north through the Stockmeir property to Stevens Creek Boulevard moved to the front burner when a big state grant came through last fall. The grant will help fund both creek restoration and trail construction, with work to be completed by 2013.

In Fond Memory of Volunteer of the Year Fritz Stawitcke



Maya Angelou famously said, "I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel." This year, the Board of Directors of the Friends of Stevens Creek Trail is honored to present the Volunteer of the Year Award to a man who has left a lasting and inspiring impression on every person he ever met. Frederick "Fritz" Stawitcke was a member of the board of the Friends of Stevens Creek Trail since 2009, but an enthusiastic volunteer long before that. In December of 2010, Fritz suddenly and unexpectedly passed away. Coincidentally, he had just been unanimously voted Vice President.

Fritz was always passionate about his community, whether it be his Cherryhill Neighborhood involvement in Sunnyvale or his wider involvement with the Friends of Stevens Creek Trail throughout the Silicon Valley. Fritz was first introduced to the organization through Anne Ng. Originally helping out at the annual Trailblazer Race by hauling around props and equipment, Fritz quickly became an indispensable volunteer. His easy-going attitude and eagerness to help with even the least desirable tasks was admired and appreciated by all.

As Fritz became a more avid cyclist, he also began to advocate more on behalf of the Friends. On any given weekend, you would find Fritz and his wife Andrea, and sometimes also their daughters Meghan and Darian, taking leisurely bike rides along the trail. Fritz' enthusiasm for the Friends was contagious, and he often brought along his family to Friends events, such as creek clean-up days or the Trailblazer Race. His wife and daughters have fond memories of helping out at the 2010 Race together as a family.

As a board member, Fritz was quick to offer rational and objective opinions; he always strived to present both sides of an issue, and his opinion was valued highly. He was passionate about his city, Sunnyvale, and worked tirelessly to involve not only the people but also the City Council in the furthering of the Friends' mission. He had

friends within City Council with whom he often chatted about the latest developments along the trail, and he was always quick to share a fact or a story about the benefits of developing the trail.

Fritz brought his wit, charm, and seemingly boundless energy to every activity he engaged in, and was so much fun to be around. His presence was so positive and strong that it is still hard to believe he is gone. We will miss him deeply and think of him often.
